2023 Tax Rates

• Taxes:

Oromocto: Mil rate held at 1.4051 (no increase) Lincoln: Mil rate to 0.9007 (increased by 0.035) Non-residential tax ratio 1.7 (increased by 0.2)

- Water/Sewer:
 - Fixed rate to increase to \$37/quarter (\$100 annual increase per household)

A Word on Taxes

- Taxes are derived from **assessed value** x **tax rate (mil rate)**
- Assessed Value determined by Province (the investment)
- Mil rate determined by Mayor and Council (staff advice provided)
- 1 cent increase to the mil rate is equal to \$136K in new revenue for Oromocto and \$26K for Lincoln





Highlights

This budget allows us to:

- Proceed with some planning of the Cultural and Recreation Centre Build (Hubbard School decision very soon)
- Catch up on some delayed capital reinvestment in roads/equipment and fleet
- To start dealing with the growing cost of water/sewer
- Proceed with some planning of new sewage treatment/force main system
- To cover new CBAs (wage increases)
- To invest in some new plans (financial/asset management/departmental) to move the Town forward over the next 5 + years

This budget does not allow us to:

- Replace <u>all</u> of the aging fleet of fire fighting vehicles and equipment for public works
- Upgrade some of our old infrastructure challenges (KAA, Library, Community Centre and Old Town Hall)
- Catch-up on all of the capital asset reinvestment that is needed (paving, streetlights, walkways, storm water systems, etc.)
- Build anything new





2023 – Macro Pressures

- New Cultural and Recreational facility Design/Planning w/Hubbard Street School Infrastructure (\$125K)
- Regional Pressures (Pool/Playhouse) + New Regional Service Fees (\$245K)
- New Governance model (Loss of Community Equalization Grant \$100K)
- Water/Sewer costs (facing increases in rates from Base of 185/285%)
- New Sewage Treatment Plant/force main infrastructure required for growth (\$200K for studies and design)
- Catch up on delayed capital re-investment (\$4.2M)
- Inflationary Operating Costs (power/fuel/materials and labour) CPI 6.8%
- Wage increases (two CBAs)
- LGR procedural costs/operational gap (\$110K)
- Debt Repayment: We currently owe 4.328 Million

Water Billing

- In 2022 we introduced a new "Fixed Service Fee"
 - Aligns with other jurisdictions
 - More appropriately shares actual costs of service (system needs repairs, replaced and maintained even if a homeowner uses little or no water...)
 - Reduces volatility on projecting budget
- Original plan to be phased in over 5 years, each year requiring Council approval (we are entering year 3 of 5 where quarterly rates were to expand to \$18)
- In order to deal with renewal and capacity issues we <u>must</u> move to \$37/quarter (\$25/quarter increase)





Water Billing

- Still not charging enough
- We have a 795K delta (being assumed by water transfer)
- This delta, to cover the water costs, is currently coming from our general operating funds. Ideally, we need to eliminate this delta as quickly as possible.
- Our service provider (the Base) is requesting that the Town **increase their** water rates by 185% and sewer rates by 285% as a result of infrastructure upgrades.
- New sewage treatment plant/force main needed to address capacity and service growth in Oromocto West. (\$30 Million +/-)





Water Consumption Rates

- Currently Paying \$3.70 per cubic meter
- We are <u>not</u> recommending an increase in rates, as we transition to applying a greater fixed cost ratio.
- Long term we would like to move to a <u>lower usage rate</u> and higher fixed ratio. This will be more advantageous for planning/budgeting purposes and align with our vision of reducing water/efficiency without jeopardizing our ability to maintain and operate the system.
- This will be clearly identified in our water and sewer plan once completed in 2023.





Comparison of Costs 2023

• Note: \$100 increase on the fixed rate will create an additional 350K in revenue annually

Considerations for the Future

- Still many unknowns (new governance model, Future power rates, increased tipping fees, rising cost of fuel, etc.)
- We don't have a surplus; we made significant cuts and had stopped or delayed purchases to the point where we cannot delay any further without affecting level of service.
- No flexibility at this time...
- To build a Cultural and Recreation Centre + invest in a new sewage treatment facility we need to manage a mortgage of 2.5 3.0 million annually.
 (Approx. \$85 million to accomplish the two projects)





Recommendations For Council's Approval

- Approve the Budget for 2023
- Hold the mil rate at 1.4051 for Oromocto and set at 0.9007 for Lincoln + 1.7 multiplier on non-residential properties
- Increase the fixed rate on water bill to \$37 quarter
- Hold water consumption costs at \$3.70 per cubic meter
